STUDENTS LEARN ABOUT CURRIMUNDI CATCHMENT

CLEAN UP AUSTRALIA DAY REPORT

Currimundi Catchment Care Group: 39 participants, including 11 children, Cr Kelyn Jones and family and Nathan from Jarrod Bleijie MP's office collected 4 wheelie bins of general rubbish and 8 bags of recyclables. This included 300 tin cans, 200 plastic bottles, 300 glass bottles and plenty of free plastic covered magazines which had washed from footpaths and gutters into Currimundi Lake. The general rubbish was mostly plastic bags (including bait bags), McDonalds wrappers, cigarette butts, as well as a whipper-sniper, bumper bar, downpipe, solar light, a small Australian flag and a syringe. There was a lot of rubbish along Nicklin Way but Crummunda and Noel Burns Parks were pretty clean and seem to be improving every year. This is probably due to the dedicated locals who regularly clean up these areas. It was a great effort especially as the weather was not the best. Thanks to Kaye, Leslie, Pat, Geoff, Joan and John for their organisation.



Friends of Currimundi Lake: 34 volunteers, including our State MP Mark McArdle, registered to help from 8.30am. They covered the open ground as well as the bush, sand dunes, beach, creek banks, roadside, Coondibah Creek tributaries and the Coastal path. 11 children joined their parents and Cliff used his Buggy to collect full bags and larger items. Paper, bottles, plastic, cans, wood, a TV set, mattress and a chair were collected. The dunes were reasonably clean this year and the general feeling was that our whole area was in better shape. The rubbish was sorted for recyclables

and binned accordingly. It was encouraging to see young families involved and the area is all the better for this worthwhile exercise. Bottled water and a convivial lunch was provided by our friends Peter and Jo from Coco's Resort Currimundi. Thanks to our willing workers for their participation and a special thanks to Jan and Irene.

Parklands Community Group: 35 volunteers helped make our Clean Up Australia Day at Little Mountain successful. It was disappointing however, how many used doggy bags were collected, when this could have been avoided by dog owners doing the right thing and placing them into a bin! Used nappies, broken bottles, a DVD and a kids bike were also collected along with the usual rubbish. We also managed to plant some 300 shrubs and grasses. Thank you everyone who helped as well as Council, Little Mountain IGA and Parklands Bakery who supplied the sausage sizzle.

STORM WATER PROJECT

Currimundi Catchment Care Group (CCCG) has initiated a project with Council aimed at improving the quality of the water flowing from storm water drains in the Currimundi waterways. It may not be glamorous work but CCCG recognises that good storm water quality is needed to support the health of our waterways and that poor storm water quality presents a threat to the conservation of our aquatic ecosystems and our recreational activities.

The project comprises a survey of the condition of storm water discharge pipes and their surrounds; a survey of litter in and around discharge pipes; tracing litter back to its source; gauging the amount of litter collected in litter trap devices in the storm water system; the collection and analysis of water quality data; recommendations for maintenance and remediation works and pollution control strategies. All storm water drains will be photographed to supplement the data gathered. Work began on the project in February and will extend through to May.

In December 2000, Cr Elaine Darling held a public meeting inviting residents who lived west of Nicklin Way and north of Currimundi Lake to form a group to support the environment. Twenty-eight people attended that meeting. On 1 March 2001, a group was formed with three specific aims - to improve water quality, limit erosion and improve the environment of the Currimundi catchment. Ten years later, CCCG still has members who attended the December and January meetings. Our focus is entirely on protecting and conserving the environment. We are 'envirocentric'. Over the last ten years the group has increased its range of activities in keeping with the interests and expertise of members and consolidated our role in community education. CCCG has always been an organisation of local residents for local residents. Everyone volunteers and there are no paid workers so it is really only the enthusiasm and energy of our members that has driven our group for these past ten years.
