FLYING HIGH ON CURRIMUNDI LAKE – SATURDAY 4 JUNE

Forget balloons! Come for a **FREE** afternoon of kite-making and kite-flying at the **Currimundi Lake entrance** opposite Cocos Beach Café on Westaway Parade, Currimundi. It is World Environment Day the next day and our aim is to draw attention to the beauty of kites as an alternative to balloons to celebrate events especially near waterways.



Discarded balloons are frequently found in our waterways and along the banks causing damage to fish and fauna when ingested or when entangled in the strings. **Kites are colourful, kites fly high in the sky, but kites go home with their owners.**

Currimundi Catchment Care Group has 200 kites for children to make and decorate with an environmental theme. They make a wonderful spectacle flying high in the sky. If you have a kite, please bring it as well. **Painting begins at 1.30pm and finishes at 3.30pm or until all kite kits run out.**

WILDFLOWER FESTIVAL WALK CURRIMUNDI CREEK

We live in an area of waterways, bikeways and walkways with a native fringe of changing vegetation and wildflowers displayed throughout the many areas. Many of us walk these pathways frequently but never stop to really notice what the plants are, what birdlife they attract or what is indigenous to the area. We often don't see the hidden gems among the mass planting.

NATIONAL TREE DAY


National Tree Day will be held in the Currimundi Catchment on **Sunday 31 July 2011.** Once again there will be a single planting activity in the Catchment organised by Parklands Community Group and supported by Currimundi Catchment Care Group, Friends of Currimundi Lake and Sunshine Coast Council. Planting will take place in Bancroft's Red Gum Bush Reserve at Little Mountain and will build on plantings from previous years. Council will supply plants, tools and gloves.

This is a fun activity for all the family and you can make a real difference to our environment by joining us. In previous years we have planted over 1,300 native plants and trees on the day. They have thrived and expanded our natural bushland and provided habitat for wildlife.

Meet at 8.00 am at the end of Lakeshore Place, Little Mountain. Planting will be followed by a free BBQ at noon. Don't forget to wear shoes, hat and sunscreen and bring water.

FLAGS FOR STOCKLAND PARK STADIUM OPENING



When Stockland Park Stadium opens on the Caloundra Show Holiday, Friday 3 June, the event will have a green and sustainable theme. As Stockland Park is beside Lake Kawana and is in the Currimundi Catchment, Currimundi Catchment Care Group (CCCG) has been asked to help celebrate the late afternoon opening. Our environmental message again is that there are better alternatives to balloons for celebrations especially near waterways.

Quad Park Corporation chair Cr Keryn Jones said "This grandstand will be the first building block - the heart of the future stadium – which can be expanded upon as needs grow and funds permit. What we will deliver by June 2011 is a facility that will meet the needs of our community in the short to medium term for both our regional and senior teams - as well as a venue that our junior competitors can utilise for major events and finals."

At this family friendly event, CCCG and the Council team will help juniors decorate flags in their club colours to use at future sporting events.

MYRTLE RUST – A SERIOUS THREAT

Myrtle Rust is a serious fungal infection that affects a number of Australian native plant species. It has recently been detected in several areas of Queensland including the Sunshine Coast. It has the potential to have a disastrous impact on our precious bushland. Sunshine Coast Council and Biosecurity Queensland are calling on residents to be vigilant for outbreaks and to report any suspected cases to Biosecurity Queensland on 13 25 23.



Myrtle Rust (*Uredo rangelii*) can be identified by raised spots or pustules on leaves that turn a distinctive egg-yolk yellow in colour. It is not harmful to humans or animals but it can have serious effects on infected trees with defoliation, dieback or even plant death.



The fungus attacks trees such as Lilly Pilly, Beach Cherry, Water Gum, Bottle Brush, Lemon Scented Myrtle, Tea Tree, Paperbark, Claret Top and Rose Apple.

You can help limit the spread of this infection and protect our native plants and the wildlife that depends on them. Tell your friends and neighbours about the problem and ask them to watch out for infections. Do not move any infected plant material as that has the potential to spread the infection.

RIVERSWEEP – CLEAN UP THE CURRIMUNDI

People of all ages came in their kayaks and canoes to help clean up the waters of Currimundi Lake for Riversweep. President David said that there has been a reduction in the number of large items taken out of the waterways over the last three years. However, plastic bags, balloons, polystyrene balls, cigarette butts, fast food wrappers and fishing line and hooks are still a major litter problem. Everyone loves the Currimundi waterways and it is rewarding to see that more volunteers are coming from outside the catchment to help protect and preserve the natural assets that we have here.

FISH SURVEY

Currimundi Catchment Care Group is looking for people who fish in the Currimundi waterways to help with a fish survey. The survey will be compiled by recording the species and quantity of fish caught from 1 June to 31 August. The variety of species and quantity of fish living in a waterway can be used as an indicator of the health of a waterway.

Eventually it reaches the Currimundi Creek South Arm, and from there flows east to the Lake. So that's what happens to water falling on the street where I live. And now I'm an active member of CCCG too!

Friends of Currimundi Lake (FOCL) have been busy weeding on both sides of Currimundi Lake. This term Caloundra Primary School will assist with further plantings of the Richmond Birdwing Butterfly Vine. Council will spray/poison the Gloriosa Lily which will be monitored to evaluate the success of eradicating this fast growing vine.

We are also working with Parks and Wildlife in Kathleen McArthur Park to formulate a plan of attack on the weeds on the coastal dunes. Looking at the weeds we will beat them or grow old with them! Two FOCL members are working with the Tidy Towns Group to enter Caloundra 4551 in the Keep Australia Beautiful Competition and protecting the environment is one of the criteria.

The turtle season is finished for 2010/11 with no nests on Currimundi Beach this season. The final meeting with Professor Roger Tomlinson regarding the Currimundi Lake Dynamics Report has been held.
