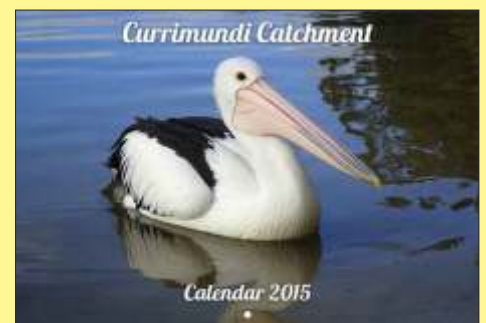

“6 KNOTS - NO WASH” MEANS SLOW DOWN TO PREVENT EROSION



Speeding along Currimundi Lake may be fun but the wash from this boat will contribute to erosion of the banks and eventually to trees toppling into the lake.



If you're out boating, look behind to make sure there are no waves from your boat

strong enough to wash up on the banks of the lake and creeks. And if you have visitors for the holidays remind them of the need to slow down on the waterways. That way you'll all be keeping boat wash to a minimum to ensure the waterways will be here for many years to come.

Don't destroy what you came to enjoy!

This is a legal speed limit. Maritime Safety Queensland, Fisheries Queensland and Water Police can impose an **on-the-spot fine of 3 penalty units (currently \$341)** for exceeding 6 knots or creating a wash capable of causing a marine incident.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?



The name Currimundi comes from the language of the Gubbi Gubbi people, the indigenous inhabitants of this area. Different spellings of the word appear in historical records, but the meaning is a place of flying foxes.

The land was surveyed in 1845 and the first European settler was Thomas Ballinger in 1861.

He settled on the southern side of the lake and ran sheep on the land including Battery Hill which was named during the 1880s when the land was fortified because of fears that the Russians would invade Australia.

In more recent times, the Battery Hill name was retained in recognition of the area's World War Two history, where Australian troops undertook artillery training in the vicinity of Currimundi and Battery Hill.

The name Kawana was adopted in the late 1950s and is an Aboriginal word for flowers, although not from the Gubbi Gubbi language, and some years later Wurtulla was named, meaning southward.

SUMMER WATER QUALITY TIPS

Spring is a special time to enjoy the Currimundi waterways, fishing, swimming, boating and visual beauty of the waterways, their vegetation and landscapes. Critical to this enjoyment is the quality of the water.

The water quality monitoring program reports for early Spring showed that water clarity was quite high due mostly to low rainfall. 100 percent of water samples tested achieved guideline targets for acidity-alkalinity and the level of dissolved oxygen was normal for this time of the year.

While water quality may vary from hour to hour, day to day and by season there are some things we can all do to protect the waterways and improve water quality this Summer. These practices will also protect marine life and lead to safer enjoyment in the waterways.

If you have exposed soil from construction or landscaping projects, seed the area with grass or ground cover to prevent erosion and run-off into the waterways

Mulch the leaves in your yard using a lawnmower and stop them from blowing into the street where they will build up in stormwater drains

Don't throw palm fronds and other garden waste into the water

Wash the car on grass to prevent the chemicals from flowing into the waterways

Place used doggy bags into bins rather than leaving them on the beach or in parks

When you picnic by the waterway, put your rubbish in the bin or take it home

Avoid taking balloons to parks and areas near the waterways.

WALLUM GARDENS, PARKLANDS

Local residents of Parklands in Little Mountain consider themselves fortunate to have access to a lovely local park - Wallum Gardens. At first glance it is an attractive park surrounding a large pond with a footpath and grassed areas, trees, shrubs, water lilies and birdlife. On further investigation it seems this has not occurred merely by chance.

The water body started its life as a silt pond to collect runoff occurring when the area was first developed for housing. The pond area was dug out, but edges were not well-defined, and mowing of the grassed area occurred only intermittently. Exotic and native waterplants proliferated and became a problem, and there were high levels of sedimentation and recurring algal blooms.

This led to the formation of the Parklands Community Group approximately nine years ago, a group of local people with an interest in improving the appearance and function of the pond, as well as other local issues. As a result of their approaches to Council, many improvements have been made over the years - rocks have been placed around the pond, water plants are cut and removed twice a year and grass is regularly mowed.

However in spite of these improvements, the Parklands Community Group still has major concerns about the function of the pond, observing high levels of sedimentation and poor water quality. The pond receives water via a number of storm water inlets from the nearby residential area. The primary inlet is a concrete lined channel from Parklands Boulevard which flows into a forebay lined with rocks and it is this area that has led to many of the problems with excessive sedimentation.

In June this year Council carried out major investigations to define the current state of the water body. It agreed with the Community Group that changes were needed and is expected to undertake remedial action within the next 12 months. Action will focus on improving the quality of water inflow and changes to the forebay area to prevent flow of sediment into the main pond.

If you're wondering about the relevance of this pond to Currimundi Lake, the pond has a single outlet channel at the northern tip which flows into adjacent bushland, and eventually water flows into Currimundi Creek South Arm and then on into the lake.

Well done Parklands Community Group! And congratulations to key members Ron Burnett and Dot Billingham who this year received a Queensland Day Award from local member, the Honourable Jarrod Bleijie, for their contribution to the community.

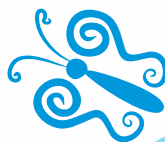

Group Reports

Currimundi Catchment Care Group

I am pleased to announce that Currimundi Catchment Care Group have entered into an Environmental Levy Partnership with Sunshine Coast Council for the next three years. The partnership continues many years of close and productive cooperation with the Council. It will fund our major projects and activities including printing this newsletter, our community water quality monitoring program, erosion control work, some administration costs like running our website, printing and storage costs and annual projects like Clean Up Australia Day and Riversweep.

CCCG have long recognised the importance of supporting students studying in the field of environmental science and related subjects. They are the conservationists of the future who will carry on caring for our environment. During the last couple of months we have visited Kawana Sate College to talk to year 11 science students. We were thrilled to learn that a Masters Degree student from the Netherlands had chosen the Currimundi Catchment as her thesis subject. We have been working closing with Yolanda while she spends six months at the University of Sunshine Coast to complete her research. We have also assisted a University of Queensland Master's student on her thesis also focussing on our catchment and our group.

This term we have hosted Yolanda Arkesteijn, a post graduate student from the Netherlands who is studying the Currimundi Catchment as part of her study in International Land and Water Management. Her final report is expected shortly.

As usual we are pulling out weeds, and although the weeds are still prolific, native plants are seeding far earlier partly because of the dry and warmer weather. Vandals have again removed about twenty of our small native plants, a growing problem in our area as well as trees being cut indiscriminately. Asparagus weed is being targeted in the Currimundi Lake (Kathleen McArthur) Conservation Park, assisted by a small group from the Green Army Program. The final working bee for this year will be on 10 December, starting again on 10 February 2015.

The first turtle at Mon Repos has arrived - a flat back. We will have monitors on the beach each day, but if you see turtle tracks on the Currimundi/Ballinger Beaches please ring me on 5437 6481 as I am the Coordinator for these beaches.

Erosion along the foreshores of the lake will be a major issue this summer with the increase of visitors over the holiday break. Hopefully the new fence will be up by then. We ask everyone to please be kind to our environment and our sea creatures over the Christmas period by being responsible with your litter. Have a great and safe Christmas.
