## IT'S NOT A 4WD THEY'RE TURTLE TRACKS!

The Turtle season has started with turtles arriving at Mon Repos near Bundaberg, and we usually get our first turtle about two weeks later.

Sunshine Coast Turtlecare region representatives have commenced their early morning walks on all beaches within the region.

Turtle tracks are readily identified and there is always one track from the tideline and one back.

If you see turtle tracks please note the beach access number and whether tracks are left or right of it, and report to TurtleCare Sunshine Coast on 0437 559 067.

## OUR BLACK COCKATOOS

The Glossy Black Cockatoo is listed as a threatened species in Queensland and there is still little knowledge of the estimated population size and distribution of the species in the region. To add to this knowledge, a Birding Day each year on 30 October is a "citizen science" initiative coordinated by the Glossy Black Conservancy. Observations and records from trained volunteers add to knowledge of the estimated population size, distribution and habitat use.

While Glossy Black Cockatoos are quite rarely seen in the Currimundi region, there are frequent sightings of the Yellow-Tailed Black Cockatoo, and it's sometimes difficult to tell the difference.

In spite of its name, the Glossy Black Cockatoo is in reality a dark brown to dull black colour with red or orange-red tail panels. Males have a brownish tinge on the head and breast, while females have irregular yellow blotches on head and neck and their tail panels have black bars. They grow to

approximately 48 cm and are seen in groups of two to three. They sit quietly and feed almost exclusively on the seeds of casuarina trees or she-oaks.

The Yellow-Tailed Black Cockatoo has glossy dark plumage and yellow cheek patches, that make it look similar to a female Glossy Black. They have yellow tail feathers and are much bigger birds at around 60 cm. They're quite different in behaviour to Glossy Blacks as they feed in small to large, VERY noisy flocks. The favoured food is seeds of native trees and pinecones, but they also feed on the seeds of ground plants and occasionally on insects.

## WELL DONE CALOUNDRA BOOMERANG BAGS!

After only around 18 months in existence, the local Boomerang Bags group was recognised in the 5th annual Caloundra Electorate Community Awards on 3 November. State Member for Caloundra Mark McArdle congratulated the local community for their outstanding work, stating "... these Awards are about recognising the best of the best in our community and I am continually inspired by the people who are nominated each year."

The award for Boomerang Bags was as the Environmental Contributor of the year, for their work creating more than 1500 reusable shopping bags from repurposed materials with the goal of eliminating the use of plastic bags.

## WEED ALERT

A reminder about one tricky weed that was very troublesome at a recent working bee at Lakeside Villas. It's called Coral Creeper (*Barleria repens*). It tends to form dense infestations and reproduces by seeds and via its rooting stems.

So if you see this plant in a nursery please don't take it home for a Christmas gift!



## HOME AWAY FROM HOME



If you look up while walking through our local parks, you may spot small nesting boxes nestling in the tree-tops. These provide shelter for small wildlife like micro-bats, possums and small native birds. Normally these little creatures would find homes in hollow logs or hollows in trees. Sadly as our urban environment encroaches on the rapidly dwindling natural bush, these homes are becoming harder to find.

All is not lost though. Sunshine Coast Council with the help of local environmental groups has for several years been erecting and maintaining nesting boxes to help the homeless critters. In July this year, Currimundi Catchment Care Group contracted with a local specialist firm, Hollow Log Homes, to build and install six new nesting boxes in Noel Burns Park and Crummunda Park. We recorded their GPS positions so we can go back later and check out the new residents of these luxury new bush-homes. The project was made possible with funding from our Sunshine Coast Council Environment Levy Partnership.

## TALARA PRIMARY IN THE PARK

For several years now, Currimundi Catchment Care Group (CCCG) has hosted year 3 students from Talara Primary College for an excursion event in Noel Burns Park on the shores of Lake Currimundi.

Volunteers from CCCG speak to each class in turn about the benefits to the local community of having such wonderful places to visit and enjoy and how we can all care for these important local landmarks and the environment. The kids then complete a drawing exercise, sketching elements in the park or Lake.

It is always a pleasure to host these wonderful youngsters and help them gain an understanding of where they fit within their local environment. We always enjoy hearing their excited chatter as the class groups walk from school and along the lake shore to join us. Sadly this year, mosquitoes had taken over the park and we were only able to meet with three of the seven classes before teachers decided it was not suitable for our visitors.

CCCG has a long association with Talara Primary College. We are grateful to them for allowing us to hold our regular meetings after-hours in their library, we have addressed the kids from TEAK (Talara Environmentally Aware Kids) and we have worked with teachers and volunteers from the school on a project to regenerate their Wallum themed 'Living Classroom' garden within the school grounds.

There will be two clean-up sites in the catchment. Friends of Currimundi Lake will meet at the usual site in Cliff Hargreaves Park with sign on between 8.00 and 8.30 am. Enclosed shoes are required for everyone, gloves, sunscreen and insect repellent will be supplied on the day, also a sausage sizzle afterwards about 10.30 am.

Currimundi Catchment Care Group will advise its meeting place later via Facebook, website and eBulletin. This is a great morning out for the family, and will be the last event before the introduction of the drink container deposit scheme and the ban on single-use plastic bags in July 2018. It will be good to have a thorough clean-up so we compare results the following year.

## BOATIES - SLOW DOWN!

It's holiday time and that means more people out on the water. All the more reason to think about the eroding effect of boat wash on the fragile banks of Currimundi Lake and creeks. We all need to preserve our waterways for generations to come.

To all the boaties out there.

- keep your speed under 6 knots
- in the narrower parts of the waterway, look behind to make sure there are no waves from your boat strong enough to wash up on the banks
- slow right down when performing U-turns
- ensure that all family members and others using your boat follow these practices.

And don't forget - there are fines for speeding that can and will be imposed by Water Police and other government authorities.
